THE SELF-SUFFICIENCY STANDARD FOR INDIANA 2016

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What is the Self-Sufficiency Standard?

- Measures the basic costs needed for a family of a given composition to get by where they live
- In Indiana, covers 472 family types in all 92 counties
- Methodology developed by Dr. Diana Pearce of the University of Washington
- Used in 38 states, often housed by state agencies, universities, non-profits

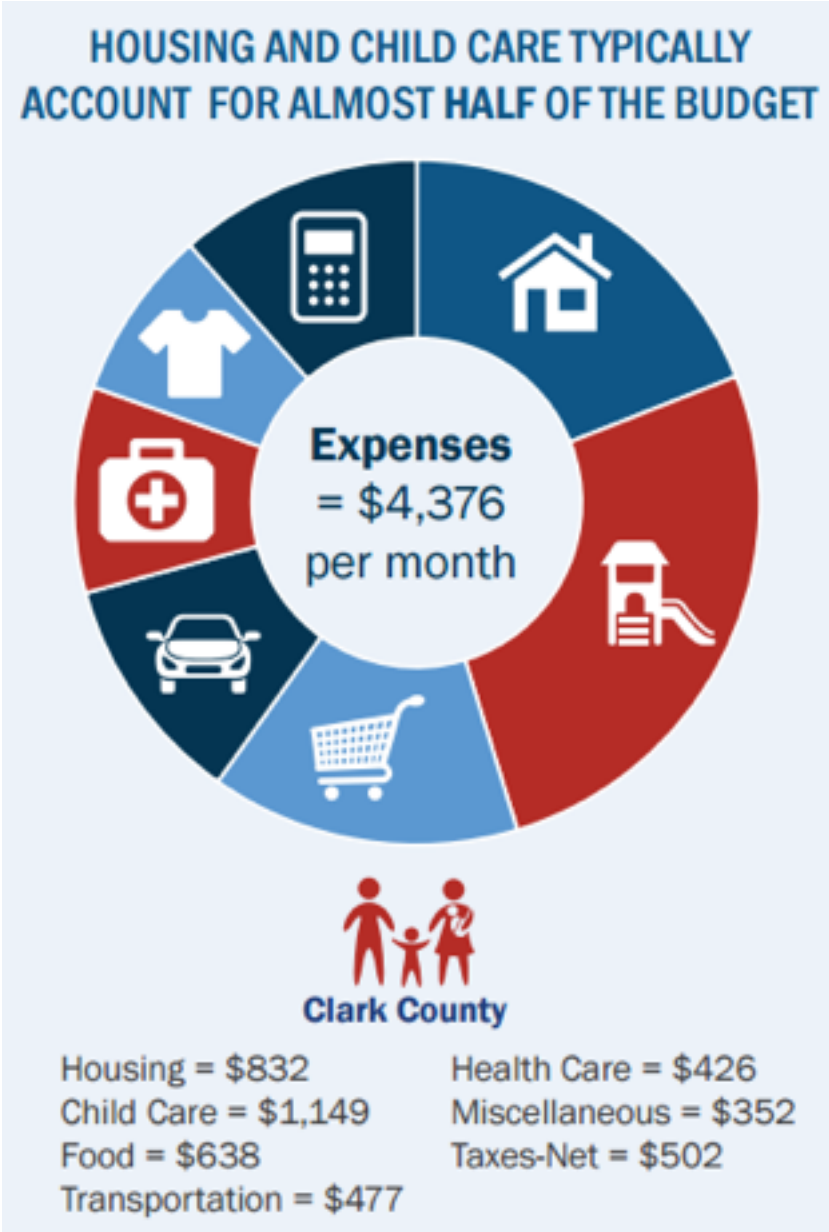
2011 Indiana House Resolution 62

“Urging state agencies to use Self-Sufficiency Standard when counseling”

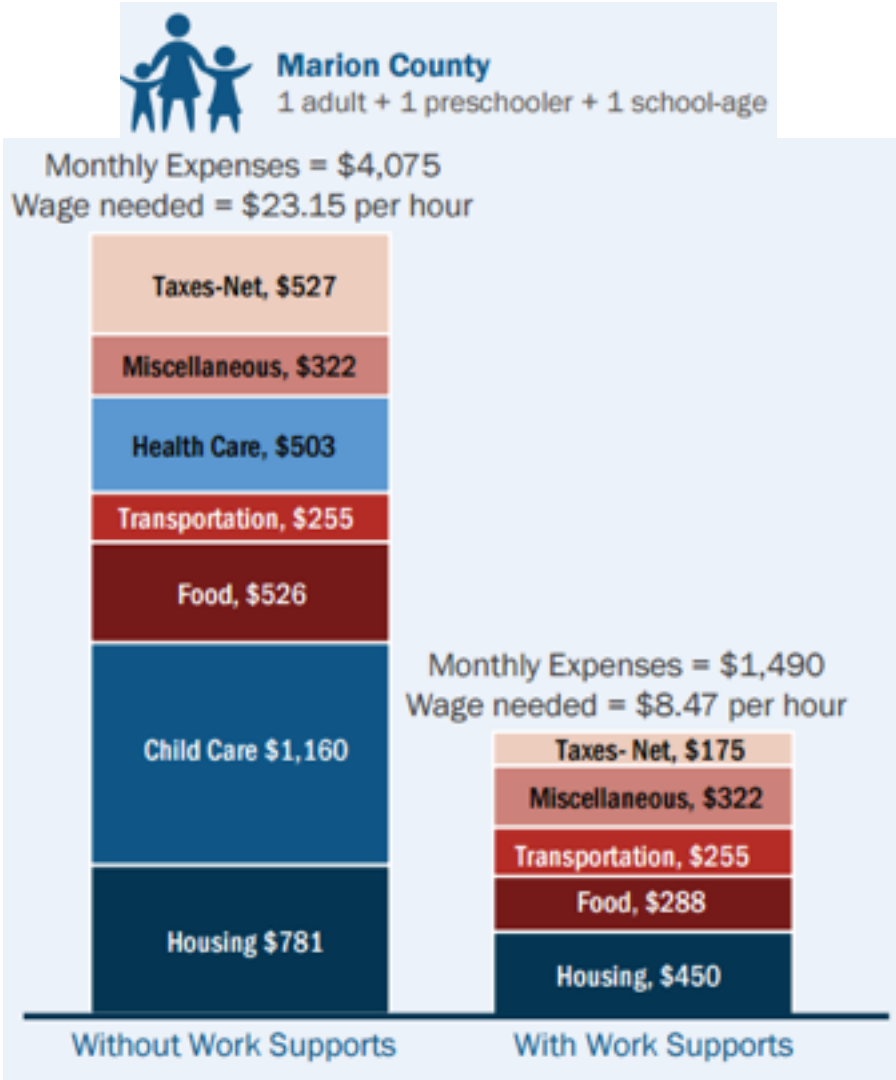
*Be it resolved by the House of Representatives
of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana,
the Senate concurring:*

- 1 SECTION 1. That the Indiana House of Representatives urges state
2 agencies to use the Self-Sufficiency Standard when counseling
3 individuals who seek assistance, education, training, or employment,
4 including:
- 5 (1) during financial planning, in order to help clients evaluate
6 strategies to reach self-sufficient wages;
 - 7 (2) during career counseling, to help participants make choices
8 among various occupations and jobs; and
 - 9 (3) when helping clients set a budget, to demonstrate the real
10 costs of becoming economically independent.

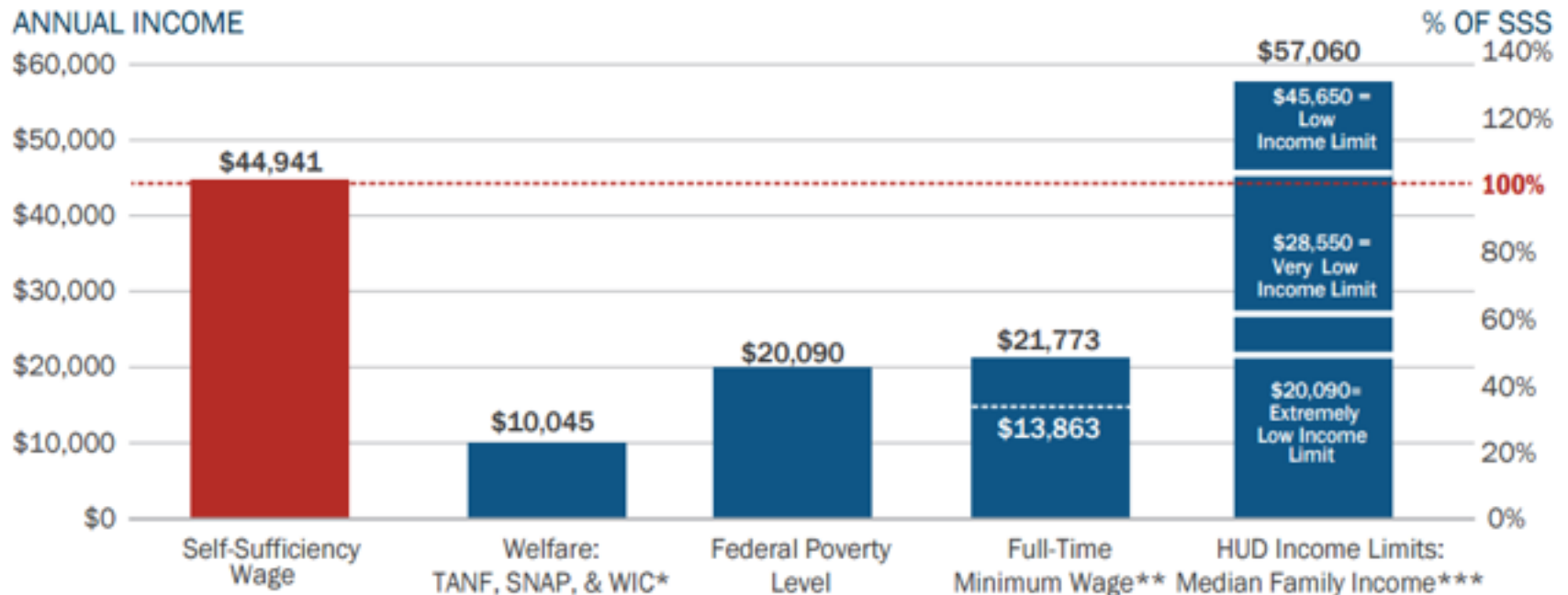

The Indiana Self-Sufficiency Standard shows that the federal minimum wage of **\$7.25 AN HOUR WILL NOT SUPPORT A SINGLE ADULT IN ANY COUNTY IN INDIANA IN 2016.**

To make ends meet without seeking public or private assistance, a single Hoosier adult must make a minimum of \$7.96 an hour (if living in Vermillion County) or as much as \$11.39 (if living in Hamilton County).

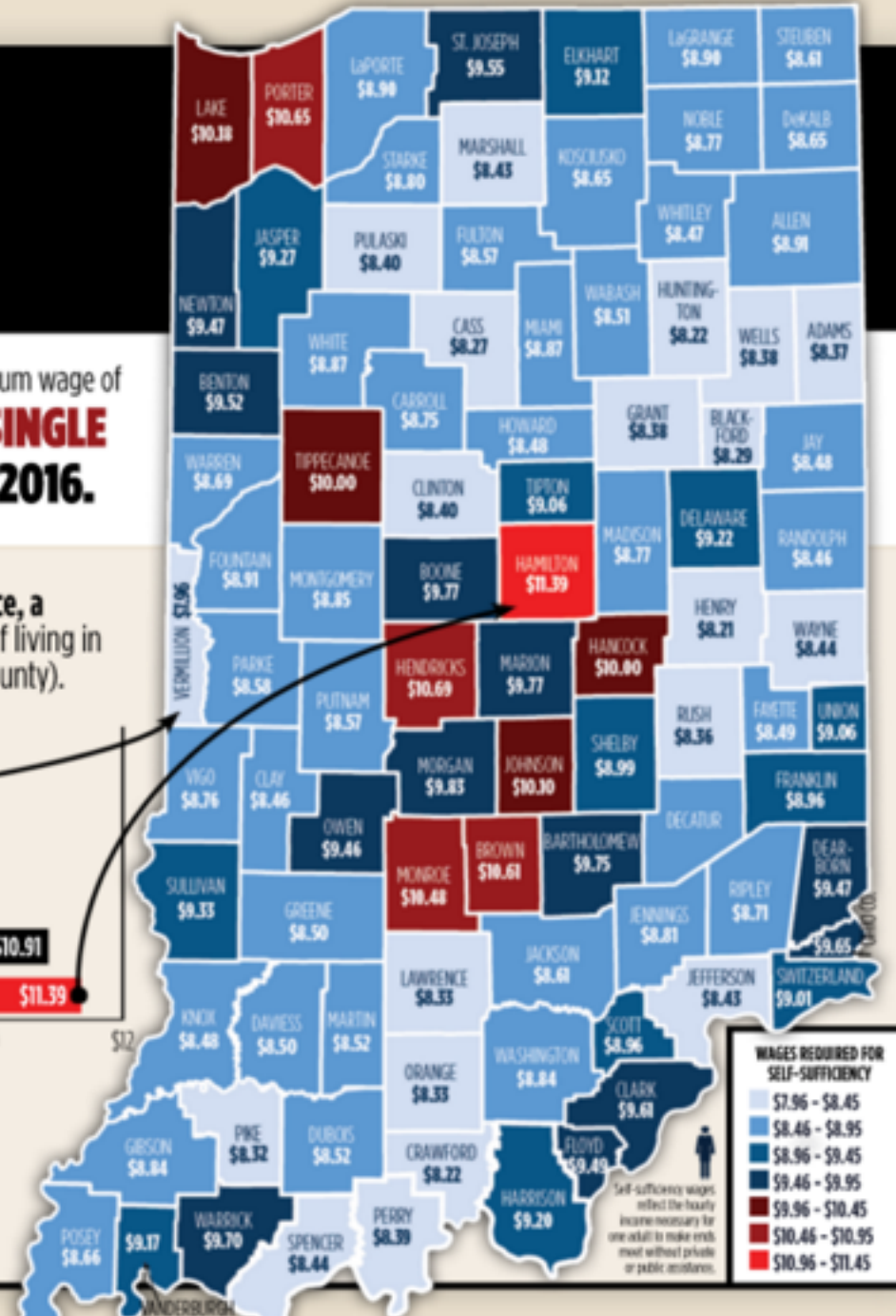
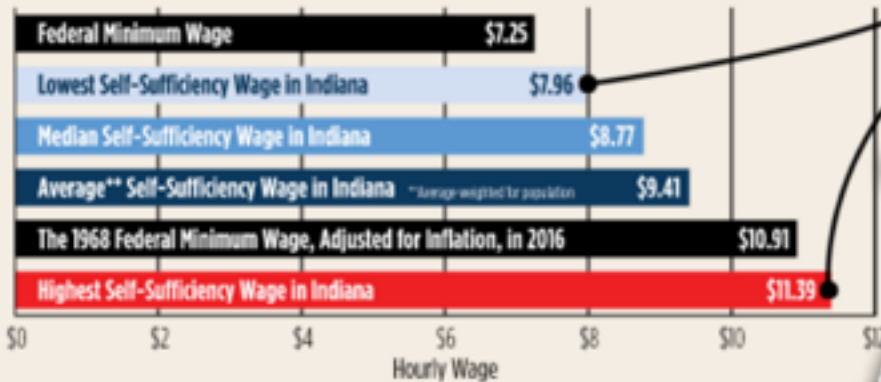


FIGURE A. Map of Counties by Level of Hourly Self-Sufficiency Wage One Adult and One Preschooler, IN 2016

The least expensive Indiana counties require between \$13.58 and \$15.62 per hour full time. Light and Medium Blue

The next highest cost group requires between \$15.68 and \$17.35 per hour full time= Dark Blue

The highest cost group requires between \$17.36-\$23.18 per hour full time

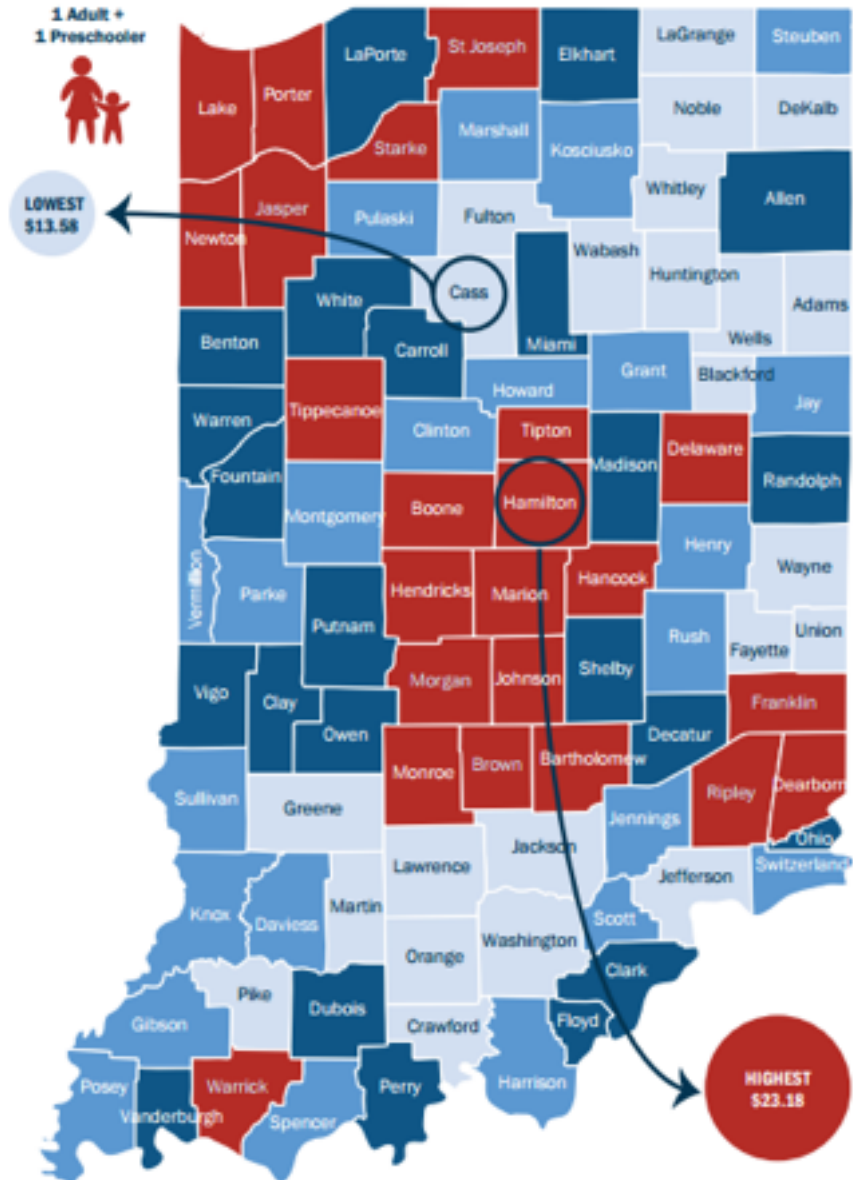
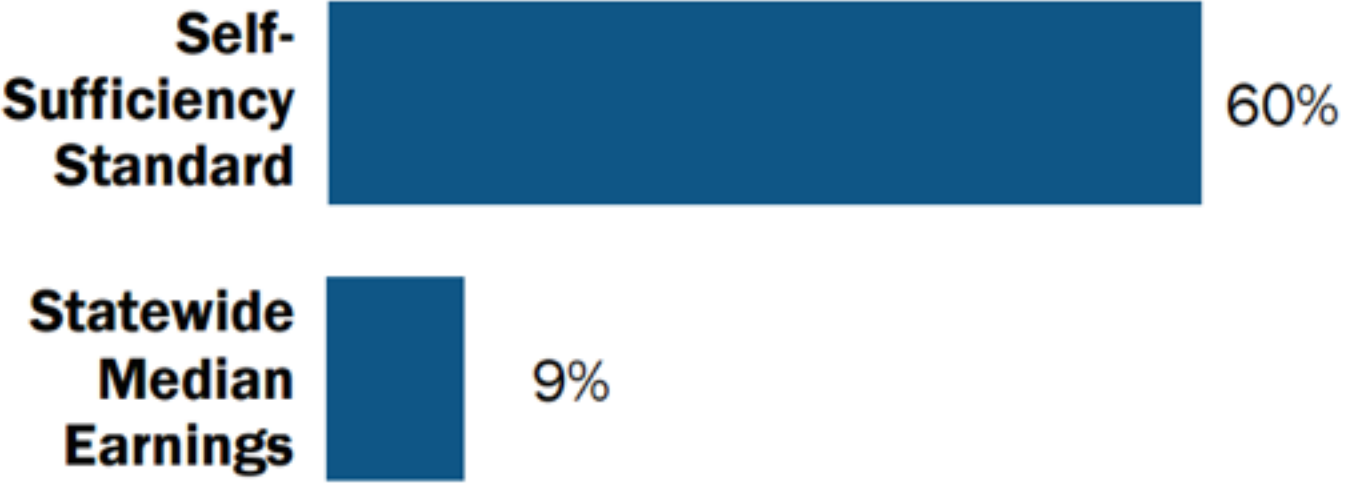

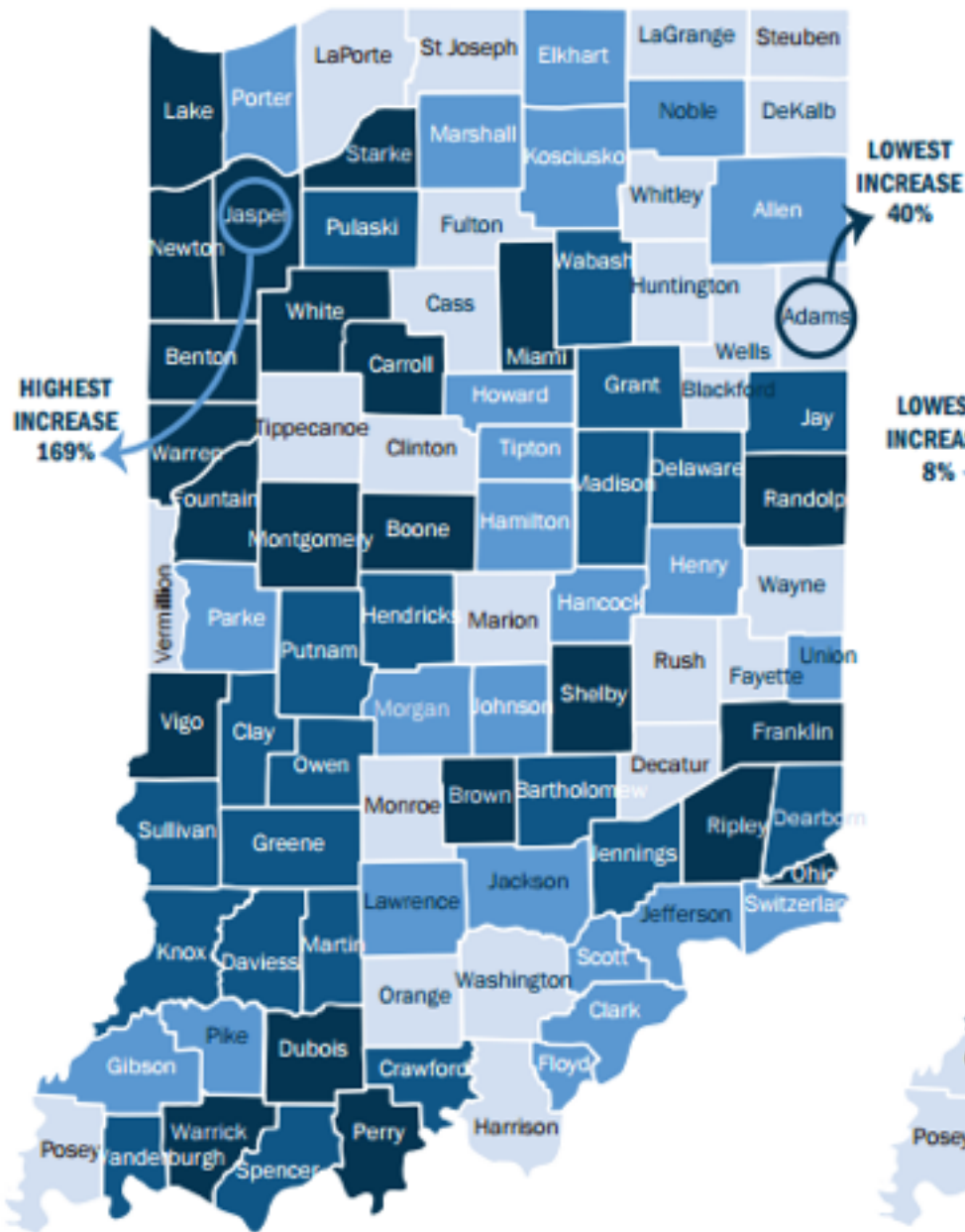

Statewide Average, IN: One Adult, One Preschooler, and One School-Age Child



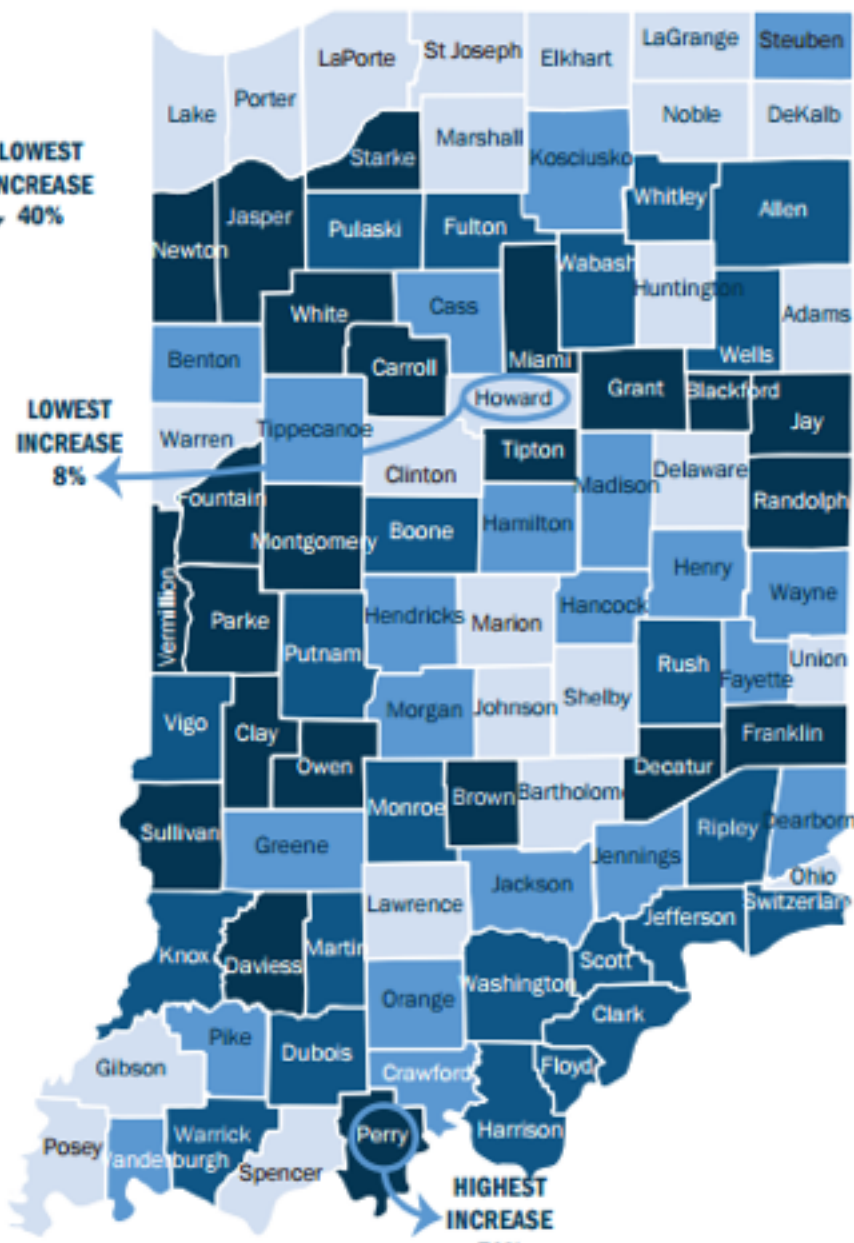
Percent Increase in the Standard, 1999-2016

Percent Increase in the Standard, 2009-2016

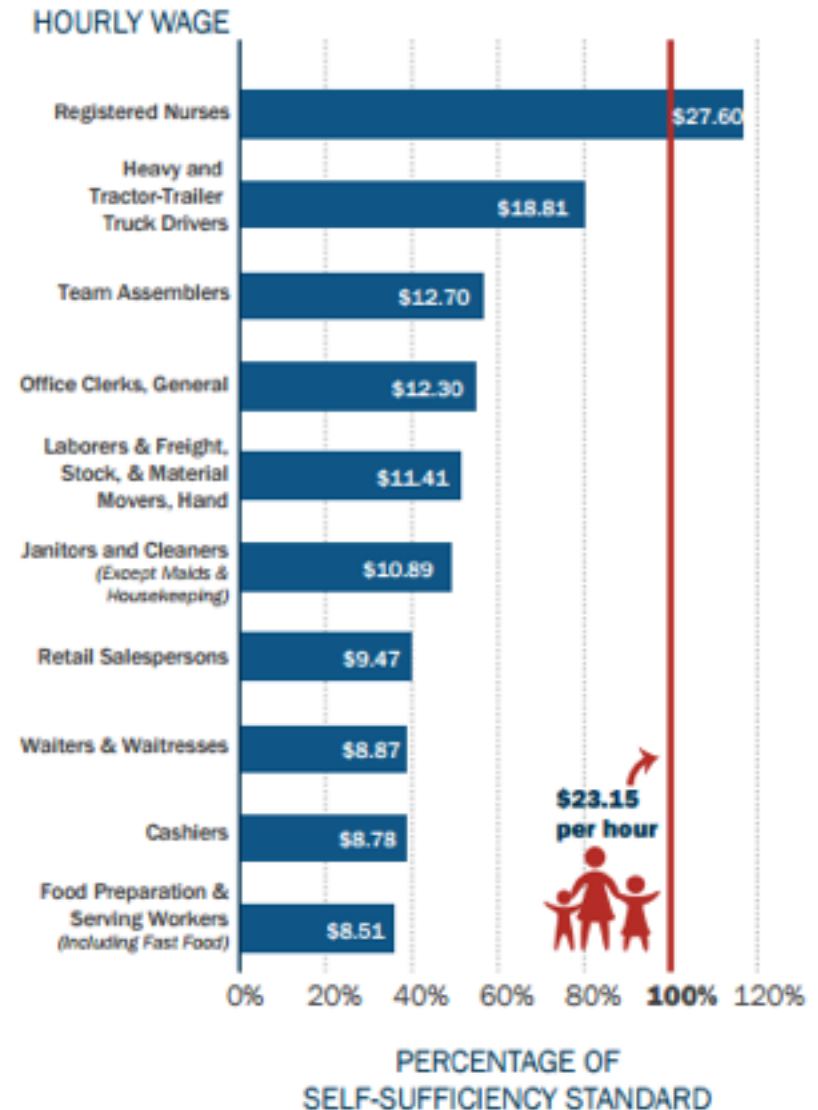

The most common Indiana occupation is retail salespersons and accounts for 3% of all Indiana workers. With median hourly earnings of \$9.47 per hour (median annual earnings of \$19,709), the most common occupation in Indiana provides workers with earnings that are less than 50% of the Standard for this family type in Marion County. In fact, two adults working full time at this wage would still not be able to earn the minimum needed to support a preschooler and a school-age child in Marion County

Both adults would have to work an additional 16 hours for a total of 56 hours per week at a retail salesperson's average wage just to meet their basic needs,

- Including the value of tax credits, at the minimum wage she would need to work about 82 hours a week to meet the cost of her basic needs.
- If tax credits are excluded from current income (as they are actually received the next year at tax filing), she would need to work 130 hours a week to meet her basic needs.





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THE ROAD TO ECONOMIC SECURITY



The Self-Sufficiency Standard approach to economic security consists of three elements: securing the costs of daily basic needs, creating an emergency savings fund, and choosing the appropriate asset-building Economic Security Pathway(s).

STEP 1: SECURE BASIC NEEDS

STEP 2: CREATE AN EMERGENCY SAVINGS FUND

Beyond meeting basic needs the next step towards economic security is saving for emergencies, particularly job loss, the most common reason for income loss. Emergency savings, together with unemployment insurance, enable families to weather economic crises, and are an essential element on the road to achieving economic security.



Step 3: Economic Security Pathways

STEP 3: CHOOSE AN ECONOMIC SECURITY PATHWAY

Once a family has secured income at the Self-Sufficiency Standard level and instituted their emergency savings fund, the road to long-term economic security will be different for each. While there are many different options, depending on family circumstances, this report considers three key pathways that many families can take to move closer to long-term economic security: (1) postsecondary education, (2) improved housing and/or homeownership, and (3) savings for retirement.
